Why Auto Assembly Plants Are Dying In Nigeria-Expert ...Over 50 Plants Shut Down in 9 Years...Only 6 Currently Active

he number of auto assembly plants in Nigeria are rapidly decreasing due to a number of avoidable factors which a player in the space and auto expert has described as disturbing.

Kunle Jaiyesimi, Deputy Managing Director of CFAO Motors, recounted these factors recently at the 2022 Nigeria Auto Journalists Association (NAJA) capacity building programme held in Ikeja, Lagos.

According to the auto boss, who doubles as the Chairman of the Auto group of the Lagos Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the current operating environment in the auto sector, makes it more profitable to import Fully Built Up vehicles than engage in local Complete Knock Down (CKD) or Semi-Knock Down (SKD) assembling.

He stated that some of the factors militating against the growth of the industry include refusal of "Presidential assent to the NAIDP Bill since the commencement of the Auto Policy or assembly scheme of the Federal Government since 2014. "Lack of incentives to those that



invested billions in the automobile assembly project; and non-availability of vehicle finance scheme despite the collection of over N180 billion levies on Fully Built vehicles by the Nigeria Customs Service on behalf of the NADDC (National Automotive Design and

Development Council)/FG (Federal Government).

Other factors identified include frequent upgrade of imported vehicles (SKD/ CKD) values by the Nigeria Customs Service; and delay in vehicles/containers clearing process as a result of bottlenecks at the ports due to activities of various government agencies at the ports". Jaiyesimi also listed non provision of forex by the CBN (Central Bank of Nigeria) for settlement of our L/Cs and reduction of duty payable for non-assemblers and used vehicle importers as other contributory factors.

NADDC's Property, Equipment Waste Away Nation wide- Says Ex-Boss

Several billions of naira invested by the Federal Government in acquiring massive land and equipment for automotive projects may have gone down the drain, a former Acting Director General of the National Automotive Design and Development Council, Mr Luqman Mamudu, has said.

He stated this in Abuja, where chief executive officers of auto companies and other stakeholders called for a review of Finance Act making it difficult for local auto assemblers to compete with sellers of fully built imported vehicles.

They spoke at Auto CEOs Forum, an interactive session involving major players, Ministry of Industry Trade and Investment, heads of relevant government agencies such as Nigeria Customs Service, Bureau of Public Procurement and National Drug Law Enforcement Agency, National Bureau of Statistics and National Automotive Design and Development Council.

Mamudu said the FG invested billions of naira to acquire the huge land and import needed equipment for industrial clusters in six major cities across the country to give the auto policy a sound footing.

For instance, he said in Ikorodu, Lagos State, while about N1bn was spent to bring in test equipment for a facility to test vehicles emission level, the government paid N300m for the land housing the test centre.

Mamudu however lamented that nothing was currently happening the Lagos centre and other places.

He debunked the insinuation the NADDC did not consult widely before the auto policy was put together, adding that for about six months the agency held meetings and with other agencies, relevant groups and auto players on the matter.

He gave an overview of the policy, its objectives using a global template and the requirements to actualise the project such as incentives to attract investors/OEMs, acceptable credit facility for vehicle assemblers and buyers and anti-smuggling programme.

He said, "There is no need to change the NAIDP. We only need. We need to review time taken for renewal of yearly licence. It doesn't have to take five months.

The Comptroller General of NCS, Col. Hameed Ali, represented by Controller Musa Mba, said the agency was carried along in formulating the policy.

According to him, they only implement the duty as passed onto the agency.

Chairman of National Drug Law Enforcement Agency, Brig Gen Buba Marwa, who spoke through Mr. Gadzama Bashir, accused some auto importers of bringing in hard drugs.

Indeed, he said some import cars from Canada concealed with Colorado, a variant of cannabis sativa (Indian hemp).

He called for the cooperation of auto players to rid the country of banned substance. Auto CEOs who spoke through Olutobi Ajayi of Nord Motors, Taiwo Shittu of Lanre Shittu Motors, and Deputy Managing Director, CFAO Motors, Kunke Jaiyesinmi, the current import duty of 10 per cent import duty for fully built units (vehicles) and 10 per cent for Semi-Knocked Down vehicles was discouraging local assembly of vehicles.

There is no way local assembly plants can compete with FBU vehicle importers at 10 per cent duty. We buy diesel, pay workers, among other running cost but they don't do," said Ajayi. They called for a review of the Finance Act.

No To Nationwide Okada Ban

he federal government has . said it is considering a nationwide ban on commercial motorcycles, popularly known as okada, as well as mining activities in a bid to stem the rising insecurity across the country.

Speaking through the Attorney-General of the federation, Abubakar Malami, it was revealed that the government is considering several approaches for containing insecurity.

According to the Minister, motorcycles provide the means of transportation for terrorists while mining is their source of funds for the purchase of arms.

"Placing a ban on the use of motorcycles and mining activities will cut the supply of logistics to the terrorists. This will be done in the national interest.

"We are Nigerians because Nigeria as a country exists and any issue that will translate into a threat to national security or the corporate existence of the country requires certain sacrifices.

"So, regardless of the means that is being considered for the possible banning, this is a sacrifice that we see as what will help address the security challenges and I think no sacrifice is too big as far as that issue is concerned.

"Above all, if you are talking of banning motorcycles, for example, I think the number of people using these motorcycles is not up to 20 percent of the Nigerian population.

"So if that percentage is called to make a sacrifice that is all-pervading or affecting over 200 million Nigerians, I think that sacrifice is not too much and considered."

Parts Of A Tyre

t's important to understand how tyres work so that you can adequately assess whether your tyres are safe to drive. Understanding the different parts of a tyre will also help you when it comes to speaking to mechanics, as you can use the correct terms to locate the problem. Tyre safety is an incredibly important factor when it comes to running your car, so knowing your tyres can help you to stop any disasters before they occur.

Inner liner

The inner liner of a tyre is made from a rubber sheet that results in low air permeability. This helps the tyre to hold high pressure air inside, whilst also minimising the amount of air that is diffused through the rubber structure.

Tyre belts

These are steel belts made from woven wire sheets, placed around the surface area of the tyre to provide rigidity and reinforce its strength. Sometimes, manufacturers add a Kevlar cord, making sure the tyre is even stronger in order to increase durability and make the tyre puncture resistant.

Tyre sipes

Sipes are small grooves that are cut across larger parts of the tread. It will often look like a small slit in the tyre's tread block, and it will create an additional tread surface area for increased grip in wet, icy and snowy conditions.

Tyre tread

Tyre treads often have different patterns. As the only area where the tyre makes contact with the road, the tyre tread will provide grip and cushioning for the car, depending on the design and compound selected. Because of this, the tyre tread is one of the most important safety features on the car this why winter tyres will usually have much deeper and wider tread than normal tyres.

Tyre grooves

Grooves are part of the tyre's tread. Deeper than sipes, tyre grooves act to disperse water, ice, snow and mud, ensuring that a car can move safely on the roads in all conditions. This expels water from beneath the tyre to prevent aquaplaning.



Tyre shoulder

The shoulder of the tyre offers support and protection to the sidewall and tread of the tyre, and as one of the thickest parts of the tyre, it allows tyres to hold their form whilst drivers take the vehicle around corners and turns.

Tyre sidewall

The sidewall is one of the most commonly known components of a

tyre. It has extra thick rubber running from the bead to the tread, to make the tyre laterally stable. This is also where manufacturers put information about the tyre, so it is a good point of reference when looking for the tyre pressure or what size tyre to buy.

Tyre ply

The tyre's skeleton is made up of layers of fabric, often called the ply.

The fabric's cord fibres are woven together and coated with rubber, and the ply is placed above the inner lining of the tyre, strengthening the structure.

Beads

Ultra-strong steel coated rubbers are called the beads and form an airtight seal between the tyre and the wheel rim.

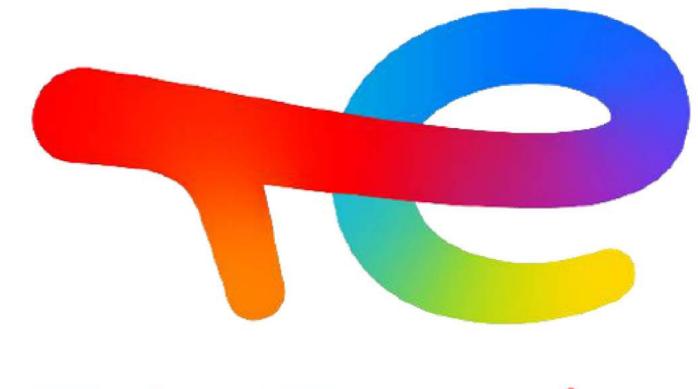

This eventually crossed 4,000MW August 10, as it hit 4,045.1MW at 6am same day, indicating a 3.97 per cent increase or 154.6MW, while the frequency of the grid was 49.19

Six Tips To Prevent Lost Luggage At The Airport



1. Fly with distinctive luggage

Avoid checking in non-descript suitcases and try not to travel with a black one. While it's a classic colour and hides wear and tear, it's also the most common, meaning other travelers or ground staff are more likely to mistake it for someone else's case.

If your baggage does go missing, you'll have to fill in a form describing what it looks like. Writing "black medium-sized suitcase" is not going to help narrow things down. Opt for something brighter and distinctive you can easily describe if required.

It also pays to avoid irregularly shaped baggage, which doesn't fit easily on the carousel, as well as backpacks with lots of loose straps, which could get caught on something as it is moved around.

2. Use an Apple AirTag or another tracking device

Apple's AirTag and similar Bluetooth tracking devices can help travelers keep track of their bags.

Priced around \$30, Apple's AirTags are the newest way to help track luggage when flying, with the Bluetooth devices easily slipped into any bag.

If your luggage goes missing, use your iPhone to decipher its location. If you're close enough, you'll be able to get precise directions to its location, which you can also share with ground staff to help them find it. If you're further away, you'll still be able to see where your luggage is. The device is tracked anytime it pings near a nearby Apple device, which can be anyone's iPhone or

iPad. If it's somewhere with no devices nearby, you'll see the last location so you'll know which country or airport it was last spotted in, all important information that can help you recover your stuff.

If you don't use an iPhone, there are similar devices available for Android smartphones such as Samsung's SmartTag.

3. Remove old baggage tags

Baggage tags from old flights should always be removed to avoid confusion when luggage is being loaded onto a plane. These tags contain critical information such as destination airport codes, codes for connecting airports and a bar code that's used for real-time tracking information.

Overworked baggage handlers could

4. Book direct flights and avoid tight layovers

Itineraries including connections increase the likelihood of luggage being delayed or lost as they invite more opportunities for human or you'll need time to get to the baggage carousel, wait for your luggage and then take it to the check-in desk where there will likely be queues.

Challenges Of Doing Business Among Auto Assemblers In Nigeria



Points of discussion

No Presidential assent to the NAIDP Bill since the commencement of the Auto Policy or assembly scheme of the Federal Govenment since 2014.

Lack of incentive to those that invested billions in the automobile assembly project.

Non-availability of vehicle finance scheme despite the collection of over N180 billion levies on Fully Built vehicles by the Nigeria Customs Service on behalf of the NADDC/ FG.

Frequent upgrade of imported vehicles (SKD/ CKD) values by the Nigeria Customs Service.

Delay in vehicles/ containers clearing process as a result of bottlenecks at the Ports due to activities of various Government agencies at the Port.

Non provision of forex by the CBN for settlement of our L/Cs.

Reduction of duty payable for non-assemblers and used vehicle importers.

Introduction:

With a population of over 115 million people, one can adjudge Nigeria as a country with huge potential for the Automotive Industry. In the 70s and 80s, Government partnership and patronage with these Auto Assembling Companies: Peugeot Automobile Nigeria (PAN) in Kaduna, Volkswagen of Nigeria (VON) in Lagos, Anambra Motor Manufacturing Company (ANAMMCO) in Enugu, Steyr Nigeria Limited in Bauchi, National Truck Manufacturers in Kano and Leyland Nigeria Limited in Ibadan contribbuted immensely to the economic development of Nigeria and the non-oil revenue of the Federal Government. However, the Oil Glut that caused the fall in Oil prices from \$27 to \$10 specifically in 1986 sent the early Auto Assemblers mentioned above into moribund as Nigeria went into recession. The funds from

Agriculture and other sectors could not keep them afloat. The economic downturn and the massive depreciation of the Naira to U.S Dollars and other major currencies of the world resulted in a surge in the importation of used vehicles (popularly called Tokunbo - as it's affordable for Nigerians, considering the continual inflation in the country) and Fully Built vehicles, leaving the very few Assemblers in existence struggling for survival with no incentive scheme or policy to protect and guide them. This worries birthed the National Automotive Industry Development Plan (NAIDP) in 2014. The objective of the Auto Policy is to discourage the importation of Fully Built vehicles into the country, encourage local Assemblers to maximize their potentials, generate employment, boost skills and manpower, instill research development, increase the nation's GDP and make Nigeria an automotive hub in West Africa and Africa in general. According to the National Automotive Design and Development Council (NADDC), 28 companies are currently assembling in Nigeria out of the 54 that registered for assembling, and out of the 408,870 units capacity per annum, only 8,473 (2%) have so far been achieved.

No Presidential assent to the NAIDP Bill since the commencement of the Auto Policy or Assembly Scheme of the FG since 2014:

The Goodluck Jonathan administration introduced the National Automotive Industry Development Plan (NAIDP) Bill in 2014 and less than a year to the Eight year-tenure of the Muhammadu Buhari administration, the bill is yet to see the light of the day in terms of legislation and accent to the final draft by the President.

At the inauguration of the \$7 million Toyota Assembly Plant with 1,330 units capacity per annum in Ghana in June 2021, the President John

Akufo-Addo said: "Government attaches great importance to the development of the automobile industry in Ghana" He also stated that: "By assembling and ultimately producing cars in Ghana, the importation of second hand used cars in Ghana will be reduced and at the same time, the export of made in Ghana cars to other African markets will earn our nation the much needed foreign exchange" (Source: The Cable June 29 2021). This and more are the aim of the Nigerian Auto Policy. Players like Toyota, Volkswagen, Nissan, Sinotruck and Katanka (indigenous) have set up assembly plants in Ghana and others like KIA and Hyundai are planning to join them pretty soon. Nigeria already has some good number of Assemblers and should do all it takes to keep them, boost their confidence and attract more investors. Reiterating my statement about the NAIDP Bill a couple of years ago, the Bill should be critically reviewed with the involvement of key players in the industry (as it was only being drafted by Civil Servants and nonplayers in the Industry) and signed into law. The Government should also consider tackling insurgency which has constrained Assemblers to some clustered spots and limiting the expansion of their sales, after-sales and services to other parts of the country, address the issue of power supply and manufacture of car accessories and development of local content which are the major reasons why a country like Ghana is recently becoming the attraction to Auto Investors and Assemblers in the West African Sub Region at the expense of Nigeria.

Lack of incentive to those that invested billions in the automobile assembly project:

The provision of juicy financial loans with single-digit interest rate for Auto Assemblers should be provided by the Government to curb the problem of inadequate

capitalization and funding. Granting Tax Breaks to Assemblers in their first few years of establishment by the Government can also serve as a good incentive measure. We have seen the enthusiasm and support of the past Government and the present Government with regards to public appearance and support of local assemblers, but this should be done holistically to benefit all the Local Assemblers. The adoption of Innoson by the Anambra State Government as its official vehicle in March 2022, is a milestone in the Industry and this is what the Federal and other State Governments should emulate.

According to the Governor of the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) Godwin Emefiele, during the introduction of Produce, Add Value and Export (PAVE) to boost export and encourage local production: "To solve the immediate and long-term economic challenges of the country, we needed to create an enabling environment with appropriate incentives to empower innovative entrepreneurs to drive growth and This statement development". shows clearly that Auto Assemblers in Nigeria need to be Incentivized.

There should be revitalization and incentivization of the auxiliary companies (Plastics/ Rubber/ Foam/glass) too since they produce complementary components/ parts that are used in the production of vehicles. This will salvage local assemblers from importation of spare parts. Over \$10 billion (about N5 trillion) is being lost yearly in Nigeria to large scale importation of Fully Built vehicles and allied components used for local assembling. Reemphasizing my viewpoint about a year ago, on the deplorable state of Petrochemical and Steel firms; the demise of Ajaokuta Steel Company, Aladja Steel Rolling Mills and departure of the tyre manufacturers, Dunlop and Michelin and other parts and components manufacturers like batteries, belts and windscreens are big setbacks to the sustenance and

development of the Automotive Industry in Nigeria.

Non provision of forex by the CBN for settlement of our Letters of Credit:

The failure of the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) to provide forex for Auto Assemblers to settle their Letters of Credits (L/Cs) slow down their businesses and puts additional pressure and cost on them even as Auto Assemblers are already overwhelmed by epileptic power supply, high cost of electricity tariff, and scarcity cum hike in the prices of fuel, diesel and gas amongst others weighing down their businesses. The CBN affirmed to this in the Communiqué No 143 of The Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) Meeting held on the 18th and 19th of July stating that "considerable rise in core inflation resulted largely from the rising cost of production due to high energy prices associated with the persistent disruptions to power supply, hike in electricity tariff, continued scarcity of Premium Motor Spirit (PMS), and rising price of Automotive Gas Oil (AGO)". The CBN is expected to sustain efforts at enhancing efficiency, liquidity and transparency in the foreign exchange market that would give special considerations to Auto Assemblers and other manufacturers via the best favourable windows to settle timely, their Letters of Credit (L/Cs) and ensure it's carried to the latter by instructing Banks to submit their L/Cs from them for verification and audit. The intents behind the establishment of the Investors' and Exporters' FX Window on April 21st 2017 by the CBN is meant to be a plus for Auto Assemblers. However, the establishment of the I & E FX Window and the claim in Q1 2022 by the CBN about the stability of the naira at the I & E Window at its 32nd Seminar tagged: "Exchange Rate Management and Economic Diversification in Nigeria: The 'PAVE' Option," are yet to yield the desired results as Assemblers still battle to source for foreign exchange amidst the depreciating value of the naira, causing instability in prices.

Non-availability of vehicle finance scheme despite the collection of over N180 billion levies on Fully Built vehicles by the Nigeria Customs Service on behalf of the NADDC/FG:

It is one thing to produce a vehicle and it is another to create an enabling environment to sell it. Local Auto Assemblers are in dire need of schemes that would make Nigerians patronize them. The rate of inflation in Nigeria is very high, thus, the ability of an average Nigerian to purchase a new vehicle is

considerably low. This underscores the need for Vehicle Finance Scheme that would enable Nigerians own new vehicles, thereby discouraging the use of imported used ones. But unfortunately, despite the collection of over N180 billion as levies by the Nigeria Customs Service, the auto Industry is still yet to witness any proper vehicle finance scheme.

In May this year, The National Automotive Design and Development Council (NADDC) through its DG, Jelani Aliyu announced a N200 billion vehicle financing scheme to enable Nigerians own brand new vehicles at ease. He said that the council was discussing with the Central Bank of Nigeria, Jaiz, Wema and Zenith Banks to provide a single-digit auto financing which will allow Nigerians take a brand new vehicle home and pay over 4, 5 or 6 years. This will be a welcome development if only it can come to fruition as it would make Nigerians patronize made-in-Nigeria vehicles. The worry is that several of such promises by the government have been announced without a latter follow up and implementation.

Frequent upgrade of imported vehicles (SKD/ CKD) values by the Nigeria Customs Service:

The Nigeria Customs Service (NCS) outrightly believes in the upgrade (increase) of the value of imported Semi-Knocked Down or Completely Knocked Down vehicles year by year, considering just model change. This process is faulty as the manufacturer may not have upgraded the vehicle models or might have only done a minor upgrade that actually does not affect all parts of a vehicle. Most manufacturers carry out full model change between 4-5. This trend should be discontinued as it discourages Auto Assemblers and mars the objectives of the Auto Policy.

Delay in vehicles/ containers clearing process as a result of bottlenecks at the Ports due to activities of various Government agencies at the Port:

The bottlenecks at the Ports by the Nigeria Customs Service (NCS) and

other Government agencies is a hinderance for Assemblers. For instance, after the issuance of the Pre-Arrival Assessment Report (PAAR) and the inspection and certification by the Valuation unit, products can still be impeded by any of these units: Gate/ Releasing/ Customs Police/ Strike Force, discrediting the PAAR that had already been certified after thorough inspection of the vehicles. One can be sent back to any of the units from which one has already been cleared. Many at times, even after the bureaucracies by the NCS and other Government agencies at the Ports, the Federal Operations Units (FOU) are still there to cause further delay on the highway en route warehouses in spite of all the clearing documents from the Ports. The poor state of the roads to & fro the seaports and the gridlocks, especially that of Apapa is another hell process for Assemblers. It was reported that Nigerians lost about N90 billion in 2020 due to bottlenecks at the Apapa Seaport.

In Q2 2021, the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) reported that, majority of the commodity exported out of Nigeria were transported via water, which accounted for N5,033.37 billion representing 99.09%, followed by Air transport that contributed N31.71billion representing 0.62% and Road transport valued at N14.36billion representing 0.28%. Similarly for imports, goods brought into the country via water transport accounted for N6,508.63billion or 93.65% of the value of total imports. Followed by Air at N359.70billion or 5.18% and Road N81.87billion or 1.18%. With these figures, the need for removing unnecessary bureaucracies at the Ports cannot be overemphasized.

To ease congestion and curb extortion, the then Finance Minister, Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala in 2012 cut the number of government agencies allowed to inspect cargo at Lagos Ports "AFRICA BUSINESS: Lagos Port Still a Bottleneck for Africa's Top Economy" (Source: The Reuters April 27th, 2015). The NCS and other Government agencies' activities at the Ports are tardy and repetitive.

Leaving behind the manual processes and automating them wholly would remove the bottlenecks which lead to demurrage and loss of sales for Auto Assemblers.

Reduction of duty payable for nonassemblers and used vehicle importers:

The Automotive Policy introduced by the Federal Government was targeted at discouraging the importation of Fully Built vehicles and encouraging local manufacturing. The policy allows local assemblers to import Completely-Knocked-Down (CKD) vehicles at zero per cent duty, and Semi-Knocked-Down (SKD) vehicles at 5 per cent duty, while importers pay a 70 per cent (35% on duty and 35% as Levy) on Fully Built (FB) vehicles (new and used). According to reports released by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS), Nigeria recorded a total sum of N1.28 trillion as the value of "used vehicles" (popularly known as Tokunbo) and motorcycles imported in one year (Q3 2019 Q2 2020), compared to N899 billion recorded in the corresponding period (Q3 Q2 2019), implying an increase of 42%. This underscores the importance and urgency of signing the Auto Policy into law to restore investors confidence. The policy somersault of the Government is the reduction of import duty from 35% to 10% and applying the same on SKDs and FBs commercial vehicles (Buses and Trucks). This flaws the fundamental objective of the Automotive policy which is to discourage the importation of Fully Built vehicles. This is more appalling, considering the fact that Assemblers in the country today are trying to maximize their potentials in the SKD operations and not in the CKD as it should be. No investor would establish an Auto Assembly Plant in a country where the cost of importing a already built vehicle is cheaper than the cost of producing a new vehicle.

Conclusion:

The urgency to have the National Automotive Industry Development Plan (NAIDP) Bill critically reviewed and signed into law cannot be overemphasized. The unfortunate thing is that while other nations are making policies that would shape their Auto Industry from 2025 - 2050, we are still lagging behind discussing what would have been settled almost one decade ago.

We Saw Hell During Apapa Gridlock- AMATO



he Association of Maritime Truck Owners AMATO, is recounting its ordeal during the dark days of Apapa gridlock under the chaotic manual truck management system supervised by the Presidential Taskforce, saying its members were made to pay between N150, 000 and N250, 000 per truck in order to access the ports to pick or drop consignments. This is coming about 18 months after

the introduction of the Electronic Truck Call-Up System codenamed 'ETO' by the Nigerian Ports Authority, which came on stream on February 27, 2021. In addition to curbing the worsening gridlock in Apapa, the new system has also reduced the cost of operation for the truckers.

Speaking recently in Lagos,

Secretary of AMATO, Sanni Mohammed Bala, noted that as against the N250, 000 spent by members then largely due to the extortion by operatives of the Presidential Taskforce headed by a former Lagos State Commissioner for Transport, Kayode Opeifa, the truckers now spend less than N30, 000 under the ETO regime.

Railway Workers Call For Better Pay

head of the planned movement of cargoes from the Apapa port by rail to Abeokuta and Ibadan, workers of the Nigerian Railway Corporation (NRC) have called on the Federal Government to implement the 95 per cent salary enhancement agreement reached between the workers and the Federal Ministry of Transportation (FMOT).

Recall that the NRC is set to commence the movement of cargoes from the Apapa port to Abeokuta and Ibadan as part of government efforts to decongest the ports in Lagos.

Speaking exclusively with the Nigerian Tribune in Lagos, Secretary General of the Nigerian Union of Railway Workers (NUR), Comrade Segun Esan explained that the workers have decided not to disrupt the operations of the NRC for now because of the appointment of a new Minister of Transportation, Alhaji Muazu Jaji Sambo.

According to Comrade Segun Esan, "We are aware that the NRC is finetuning arrangements for the movement of cargoes from the Apapa port in Lagos to Abeokuta and Ibadan. This is long overdue because the Corporation will make more money from freight haulage compared to what we make daily from passenger haulage. We welcome this development and look forward to its commencement.

"However, we are yet to see the implementation of an agreement between the workers and the Federal Government on increment in salaries and benefits. If you recall that we embarked on a three-day warning strike last year November to protest over the poor salaries railway workers are earning".

RTEAN Supports Soludo On Ticket Racketeering, Touting

led by Chukwuma Okonkwo, has lent its support to the ban on touting, ticket racketeering and diversion of Internally Generated Revenue (IGR) by unscrupulous persons.

According to Okonkwo, the ugly trends can be addressed if Governor Chukwuma Soludo partners with the association.

Okonkwo frowned on the fact that it is only in the state that RTEAN operations have been stalled by the past administration, urging Soludo to remedy the situation by allowing his men to operate voluntarily to enable his government to achieve its targets.

The RTEAN chieftain revealed that RTEAN members have official

National Automotive Industry Development Plan 2014-2022: Matters Arising

OBJECTIVES

- -Establish a dynamic fiscal policy to attract and sustain investment.
- -Assemble / manufacture 1 million automobiles for transport
- mining and agriculture by revitalizing existing facilities and attracting FDI.
- -Renew Nigerian Vehicle stock and reverse pressure on Balance of payment and strengthen the Naira through gradual increase in local content.
- -Establish automotive manufacturing infrastructure.
- -Increase industry employment and establish a self sustaining manpower development structure.

COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS OF THE NIGERIAN AUTO INDUSTRY

These countries took steps to ensure the following for their auto industry: Market:

As a matter of government policy, all government vehicle purchases are from the local automotive industry.

Ban on import of fully built units (FBU) (e.g. Brazil in the 1960s and Egypt) or high import duties, 100%-300% on FBU (the rest) during the initial phase. These duties were gradually reduced and currently range from 30%-91%. In contrast, the highest FBU import duty in Nigeria was 30%. On average the range is between 10%-20%.

Import ban of used vehicles in order to create market for their domestic automotive industries. Tariffs on small cars are low to enable vehicle purchase by the middle-class.

THE NIGERIA AUTOMOTIVE INDUSTRY DEVELOPMENT PLAN (NAIDP)

The Automotive Industry Development plan was developed after extensive consultations with existing local auto manufacturers, international OEMs, as well as MDAs.

Elements of the Automotive Industry Development Plan

MARKET DEVELOPMENT

ACTION: Automotive credit purchase program designed and initiated with N100m deposit with **CBN**

The Nigerian vehicle market was observed to hold capacity to support an indigenous automotive industry. The following programs desihned for implementation:

- (a) Affordable vehicles programme
- (b) Vehicle purchase scheme
- (c) Patronage by government and its agencies
- (d) Regulating Used Vehicle Import

MARKET DEVELOPMENT

Patronage by Government and its Agencies

Government directed that, as a first step, 50% of vehicle purchases by government should be from the local assembly plants. This is in line with government policy and the new patronage circular no. SGF.OP/I/S.3/VIII/ 250 of 12 April 2011. This figure was to be reviewed upwards with increased capacity utilization by the plants.

Regulating Used Vehicle Import:

To stop the importation of vehicles which require frequent maintenance and are not cost effective, government should:

Continue to ban the importation of cars over 8 years old.

Ban the importation of Commercial vehicles (trucks and buses) that are over 8 years old.

From 2014 onwards, charge extra levy and a minimum base price on used imported vehicles as detailed in table 15.

Vehicle Purchase Scheme:

The current annual demand for vehicles, approximately 100,000 new and 200,000 used vehicles can easily reach 500,000 with an affordable vehicle purchase scheme.

The proposed levy on vehicle imports should be used in part for creating an affordable vehicle financing scheme, including setting up consumer credit guarantee scheme.

RECOMMENDED MEASURES TO REPOSITION AND GROW **INDUSTRY**

Resumption of monitoring and Evaluation program by competent industrial officers with knowledge of the automotive industry;

Revisit of all abandoned NAIDP programs by NADDC including periodic consultative meetings

The Nigerian Minister of Works and Housing, Babatunde Fashola, has said the Federal Government is returning tolling to the Lagos-Ibadan Expressway upon completion of the rehabilitation of the highway.

In an interview on Channels Television's 'Sunday Politics', recently, the minister said about three toll plazas were expected on the highway.

While projecting the completion of the road rehabilitation to December 2022, the former governor of Lagos State said a toll plaza was expected each in the Lagos, Ogun (Ogere) and Ibadan parts of the road when completed.

On the December deadline for the completion of the road work, Fashola said there was a caveat to the realisation of that promise.

He noted that the Oyo State government was constructing a

drainage facility around the Ojoo part of the road, which, according to him, had significantly slowed down the pace of work in that area.

He, however, said he was already in talks with the Oyo State Governor, Seyi Makinde, to resolve the challenge.

Diesel Price Force NRC To Reduce Trips

he hike in diesel price has forced the Nigeria Railway Corporation to reduce the number of trips on the Lagos-Ibadan Train Service by about 66.67 per cent, it was gathered by Punch recently.

It was also learnt that the corporation had sent recommendations to the Federal Ministry of Transportation for an adjustment in the transport fare on the train service.

The Managing Director, NRC, Fidet Okhiria, told the Punch that though

the service was still running, its trips had been reduced due to the persistent hike in diesel price. Diesel prices have risen by over 300 per cent in a few months.

The spike in diesel price also warranted some level of petrol scarcity in Abuja and neighbouring states, as many truck owners could not afford the high cost, a development that made the Federal Government to raise the bridging claims being paid to petrol transporters.

Transnet Funds Rail Between SA And Botswana

outh Africa and Botswana have agreed to fund the improvement and extension of rail links between the countries in a bid to boost trade and better connect Botswana to export markets, South African stateowned logistics firm Transnet said recently.

Transnet Freight Rail (TFR) will collaborate with Botswana Rail (BR) to fix parts of the 126 km (78 mile) rail line between Swartruggens, in South Africa's North West province, and Mafikeng, on the border with Botswana, helping South Africa's landlocked northern neighbour get its minerals, including thermal coal, to market.

European countries are scrambling to meet their coal needs after a ban on imports of the fossil fuel from Russia, and coal-rich countries like Botswana are looking to cash in on the surge in demand.

The rail revamp will enable heavy haul trains to travel from Botswana to South Africa's ports of Richards Bay and Durban, TFR said. The project aims to be up and running in the next 24 months. Financial terms were not disclosed.

Let me resume properly in this office and I promise you, this will be the first issue I am going to tackle by the grace of God", the Minister assured.

Railway Retirees Protest Sale Of Quarters

he retired workers of the Nigerian Railway y Corporation, under the aegis of Railway Senior Citizens Association Eastern District Enugu, recently staged a peaceful protest in Enugu against an illegal sale of railway quarters' premises in violation of a subsisting court judgment.

The senior citizens, who carried placards with various inscriptions such as "Railway Police Enugu Stop Aiding and Abetting Contempt of Court;" "Railway Police Command Emulate Enugu State Police Command CID on Court Order;" "Railway Police Command Obey Court Orders", among others, chanted labour solidarity songs.

Addressing journalists, the Chairman of the association, Mr Monday Nnonah, lamented how government officials would violate valid and subsisting court judgments with impunity and turn around to ask to Nigerians to be law abiding.

Nnonah said that the Zonal Manager, Railway Property Company Limited, Enugu, Mr Anthony Okhibenor, had been selling the premises of the retirees' quarters with impunity, contrary to a court order which gave them right of first rejection under the Federal Government's monetisation policy.

Mr. Jime gave the indication in Makurdi recently after the inauguration of the Council's office.

According to him, an assurance has been given by the Managing Director of the National Inland Waterways Authority (NIWA) that work would soon start on the Makurdi River Port.

Jime, who also attended one-day seminar with stakeholders with the theme 'Appropriate Packaging and Quality Assurance of Argo-Allied Products as a Panacea for Increased Export', said the new port will boost economic activity in Benue State which he said would lead to job creation for people in the state.

He urged the business community in Benue State to take advantage of the export promotion drive of the federal government to access the international market with non-oil exportable goods and produce.

NIWA Reiterate Resolve Against Night Boat Operations

he National Inland Waterways Authority (NIWA) has reiterated its warning to boat operators to shun night operations beyond 7 pm.

The Managing Director of the authority, Dr George Moghalu, issued the warning at a media interactive session with transport correspondents in Lagos recently.

Moghalu said the authority had constituted a waterways task force to arrest any boat operators operating beyond the stipulated time.

The NIWA boss said the Task Force comprised the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA), Lagos State Waterways Authority (LASWA), barge operators, Maritime Workers Union of Nigeria, and the Marine Police.

According to him, studies by the authority shows that most boat accidents occur either at night or early in the morning adding that the practice must stop.

He said 'hat is part of the regulation we are putting in place, we are more concerned about people's lives, check the history of accidents even in ferries.

"You find out that over 90 per cent of accident happens in the early hours of the morning or in night and most of these vessels do not have navigational lights.

"On our own parts, we are laying buoys, trying to put navigational aids on the waterways but at the same time, we are appealing to residents in the Riverine communities to ensure the safety of this navigational equipment.

"We have come to see that vandals, thieves destroy this navigational equipment and make away with them," he said.

Moghalu said the authority would sanction offenders of laws regulating the use of the waterways. According to him, the Task Force

has the mandate to arrest people, sanction people, and prosecute people, it is no more business as usual. There must be sanity on our waterways.

He, however, said that NIWA would continue to encourage boat operators to do the right thing and reduce the incessant boat mishap on waterways by adhering to safety regulations as stipulated by it.

NIMASA, NLNG To Collaborate For Improved Operations

he Management of the Nigeria n Maritime Administration and Safety Agency, NIMASA, and that of the Nigeria Liquefied Natural Gas, NLNG, have agreed to set up a working Committee meeting regularly to ensure improved liaison between both organization in the interest of Nigeria.

This agreement was reached during a courtesy visit by the Management of the NLNG led by the Managing Director, Dr Philip Mshelbila to NIMASA.

NIMASA To Review Sponsorship Of Cadets

he Nigerian Maritime Administration and Safety Agency, NIMASA, is currently reviewing the cost of direct sponsorship of Nigerian cadets undergoing foreign training under the Nigerian Seafarers Development Programme (NSDP).

The Director General of NIMASA Dr Bashir Jamoh noted that the review of ongoing sponsorship cost has become necessary due to the global inflationary trends which is very pronounced in the Philippines, India and some other countries where Nigerian cadets are undergoing Certificate of Competency (CoC) Examination training under the NSDP programme. The sponsorship covers training leading to obtaining a Certificate of Competency, CoC. "We are not unmindful of the unforeseen global inflationary trend which has affected the cost of sustaining our cadets who are on sponsorship in some schools under

the NSDP programme".

he Apapa Command of the Nigeria Customs Service, NCS, announced the seizure of a container load of tramadol imported from Pakistan with street value of about N6 billion.

Customs Area Controller of Apapa Customs, Comptroller Yusuf Ibrahim Malanta, who disclosed this recently, said the drugs were concealed carefully with towels, but that through the eagle eyes of officers and the deployment of what he called "Forensic Manifest Management System" the drugs were discovered.

Law Enforcement Agency, NDLEA, by the Customs, according to Malanta, include "1x20ft container No. PCIU 0183241 laden with eighty-one (81) cartons of 250mg and sixtynine (69) cartons of 225mg of tramadol tablets (Each carton contains 72 rolls, each roll contains

10 packs, each pack contains 10 sachets, and each sachet contains 10 tablets) totaling 150 cartons of tramadol tablets." While receiving the container, Mr Ameh Inalegwu, Apapa Commander of NDLEA said that the Chairman of NDLEA, Brig Gen Buba Marwa (Rtd) has expressed great pride in the Apapa Customs boss.

Publisher Advises Journalists On Advantages, Dangers Of Social Media

ocial Media has been described as a revolutioner and liberaliser of Journalism practice around the globe in the 21st Century.

According to the Journal.NG magazine publisher, while social media practice has its low side like dissemination of fake news, it has digitalised the practice of journalism either as a career or pastime hobby.

"Everywhere is a newsroom, everyone given the opportunity to be the reporter, editor and publisher".

On the importance of social media in journalism, he noted that "at a face value, journalists not only benefit from the exposure that digital

environment brings, but also have unlimited amount of information available at their finger tips".

The Maritime resource person also highlighted the challenges social media could pose for quakes in journalism practice such as Fake News, Unethical Practices, Mob Journalism and Regulatory Impediments.

These challenges include cyber crime offenses when a fake practitioner is caught maligning innocent people, which attracts maximum of 2 years jail team or two million Naira or both.
